LABOR UNIONS MUST FIGHT BACK



Over the past year, working people, and union members in particular, have faced an unrelenting assault. Donald Trump has used executive orders to strip collective bargaining rights from more than one million federal employees, directly weakening unions and rolling back decades of hard-won worker protections. This is not just an attack on federal workers; it is an attack on the entire labor movement. What happens to one union member today can happen to all of us tomorrow. An injury to one truly is an injury to all.

The administration's "Billionaire First" agenda has made its priorities clear: slash jobs and benefits for working families while handing massive rewards to corporations and the ultra-wealthy. Union members see the consequences every day. Families are forced to rely on credit cards just to afford groceries. Workers are juggling car payments, rent, childcare, and healthcare costs that continue to rise. Many are working two or three jobs simply to stay afloat.
